ADVOCACY

During our stewardship of this great City, we resolve to build on this heritage and add our mark on the City's history. The City Council's vision for Fredericksburg at its 300th Anniversary is:

- To be a city animated by a sense of its unmatched, irreplaceable history;
- To be a city characterized by the beauty of its riverfront, the vibrancy of its downtown, and its safe and attractive neighborhoods;
- To be a city inspired by active arts, cultural, and education communities;
- To be a city shaped by civic involvement and economic vitality; and
- To be the city of choice for people of many income levels, cultures, ethnicities, and physical abilities to live, work, and play.

ADVOCACY

Supporting City Council's 2036 Vision Statement to be "A Proven Leader in Historic Preservation"

June 2023: City-sponsored study examined local Historic Preservation Economic Incentives for the prevention of blight & demolition by neglect of historic assets

Key economic incentive recommendations:

- 1. Sponsor a Historic Preservation Economic Impact Study focused on Fredericksburg
- 2. Increase local "Rehab Tax Credit" program up to 50% exemption of rehab cost (& change name to describe its function as a partial exemption from real estate taxes)



EVALUATION OF EXISTING PROGRAMS

City staff provided information on existing programs for consultant review. A Strengths-Weaknesses-Opportunities-Threats (SWOT) survey prepared by the consultant was distributed by staff to stakeholders. A follow-up discussion session with stakeholders was held to review and discuss conclusions gleaned from the SWOT surveys. State codes and City ordinances were reviewed. Research was conducted to explore incentive programs provided through the State of Virginia and a sampling of Virginia local qovernments and non-profit organizations.



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Marker Furthers UMW Mission on Freedom Rides' 60th Anniversary

Sixty years ago today, 13 men and women – seven Black and six white – departed Washington, D.C., on Greyhound and Trailways buses. Led by civil rights icon James L. Farmer Jr., these Freedom Riders embarked on a quest to desegregate interstate travel.

Their first stop? Fredericksburg, Virginia. The riders visited the bus station terminal and lunch counter, once located at the corner of Princess Anne and Wolfe streets, where the fire station stands today.

The bus depot was torn down years ago, but this afternoon, a historical marker was erected in its place, thanks to the tireless work of University of Mary Washington staff, faculty and students, in partnership with the City of Fredericksburg. Their efforts are part of a greater campaign to share the history of the region's Black residents, as well as UMW's commitment to keep alive the
